




Su, Celina. (2025). *Budget Justice: On building grassroots politics and solidarities*. Princeton University Press.

Drawing on extensive research on participatory budgeting, *Budget Justice* traces local struggles for collective governance and explores how grassroots movements build solidarities in contexts marked by democratic and affordability crises. Written to engage both academic audiences and broader publics, the book offers an accessible yet rigorous account of participatory democracy as a response to contemporary political challenges.

RESEARCH AND PUBLIC ENGAGEMENT

In addition to this publication, Prof. Su continues to collaborate with people's budget campaigns across the United States and is an active member of the PAR-CITY research consortium on urban participatory innovations. She was recently appointed to the New York City Mayor-Elect Zohran Mamdani's Transition Team, serving on the Community Organizing Subcommittee, where she contributes her expertise on participatory governance and civic engagement.


Although populism is widely recognized as a global phenomenon, its contemporary manifestations in the Arab world, particularly at the individual level, remain underexplored. This article assesses the prevalence of populist attitudes across the Arab world using data from the 8th wave of the Arab Opinion Index (2021–2022), covering fourteen countries. It also identifies the sociodemographic profile of "populist citizens" in the region.

This study examines the relationships between zero-sum thinking, system-justification beliefs, and attitudes toward democracy among individuals in the Middle East and North Africa living under different regime types and within diverse social contexts. The findings show that both zero-sum thinking and system-justification beliefs are negatively correlated with democratic attitudes.



Blood Ties and Politics looks closely at how politics and family life are connected. It covers important topics such as how political views are formed at home, how harmful or extreme online content can influence people, how couples with different political opinions get along, and how political arguments can affect relationships within families. It also talks about how political beliefs are passed down—or changed—across generations, and how propaganda and political messaging can create tension at home.

Family has always been considered as a primary source of social capital. The benefits it provides extend to acquisition of other forms of capital, from economic, to cultural. But discussion of the underside of social capital, which includes exclusion and cohesion, remains to be underexplored. This is particularly true when politics is the point of discussion, especially in a time of election. This paper argues that this is highly observable in Filipino families. Further, this paper argues that the need for social capital pushes individual members of a family to conform to a collective political stance rather than subscribe to personal political beliefs.

PROF. JESSICA KIM SHARES RECENT RESEARCH ON GLOBAL NORMS, PUBLIC POLICY, AND SOCIOPOLITICAL CHANGE

Drawing on world society theory and cross-national data from 135 countries (1996–2019), this article shows that rising ADHD diagnosis rates are linked to the global institutionalization of child-centered cultural perspectives and the diffusion of medicalized narratives of child well-being.

Kim, J., Henry, E. A., Carter, J., & Nuhoğlu Soysal, Y. (2025). Globalization, Populism, and Climate Skepticism: Untangling Varieties and Pathways. Environmental Sociology, 1–23.

Based on ISSP data from 26 countries, this study demonstrates that the relationship between populism and climate skepticism varies by ideological orientation and level of globalization, revealing both top-down and bottom-up mechanisms of influence.

Using event history models, this article analyzes the adoption of gender-based-violence legislation across developing countries, highlighting the role of norm cascades and international diffusion, with varying effects across income levels and policy types.

JESSICA KIM


Prof. Jessica Kim is Assistant Professor of Sociology at the University of Pittsburgh and a scholar of political sociology and international development. Her research adopts a global and transnational perspective to examine how norms are constructed, diffused, and contested across national policies, organizational practices, and public opinion. Using advanced quantitative methods, her work addresses key issues related to democracy, women's rights, health, and climate change.

PROF. DOUGLAS DE TOLEDO PIZA SHARES RECENT RESEARCH ON MIGRATION, INFORMALITY, AND MEMORY ACTIVISM IN THE GLOBAL SOUTH



DOUGLAS DE TOLEDO PIZA

Prof. Douglas de Toledo Piza is Assistant Professor of International Affairs at Lafayette College and a scholar of migration, informality, memory activism, and displacement. His research examines the intersections of (im)mobilities of people, goods, and material culture across borders, with a particular focus on East Asian migrations in South America. He holds a PhD in Sociology from The New School and has previously been affiliated with the Zolberg Institute on Migration and Mobility and the International Rescue Committee.



FEATURED BOOK:

Beyond Informality: How Chinese Migrants Transformed a Border Economy. Stanford University Press, 2025

In this book, Prof. de Toledo Piza examines the role of Chinese migrants in South America's largest informal economy of counterfeit and smuggled goods, spanning from Ciudad del Este to São Paulo. The study reveals how structural inequalities in the global economy push migrants into precarious positions while simultaneously enabling the emergence of transnational business elites capable of reshaping markets and power relations in the Global South. By tracing the interaction between law, informality, and migration, the book offers a nuanced account of how marginalized actors both endure and transform unequal economic systems.

This article introduces the concept of mnemonic activism to analyze how Nikkei activists in Brazil have challenged dominant narratives portraying Japanese migration as uniformly successful. Drawing on journalistic and governmental sources from 2013 to 2024, the authors show how activist interventions reshaped public discourse, leading to official recognition and apology for historical oppression. The study highlights the role of memory politics in claims for recognition, remembrance, and reparations.

ABDELAAZIZ EL BAKKALI





The Narratives of Filipino Youth Activists and the Effects of Red-Tagging on Philippine Democratic Backsliding: The Case of The Strongman Duterte Regime

Filipino youth activism has always been at the helm of social movements challenging the status quo, demonstrating unwavering commitment to engage, empower, and educate while pursuing the aspirations of a “good society,” “good government,” and “good politics.” Red-tagging in the Philippines has emerged as a political strategy employed by state forces that contextualizes the decades-long communist conflict, resulting in red-scare attacks, threatening labels, and even the killings of left-leaning individuals and groups, i.e., Filipino youth activists. This study revealed that: (a) the Duterte regime views Filipino youth activists as “enemies of the state and society” by demonizing their unwavering idealism, (b) red-tagging creates a chilling effect that impacts their psychological, psychosocial and cognitive well-being, and fear paralyzes resistance while fueling a culture of impunity, and (c) there is a threat to human rights, undermining both horizontal and vertical accountability, and resulting in a loss of democratic participation that could lead to democratic backsliding.

PROF. SIMON SUSEN PRESENTS RECENT WORK ON CRITICAL THEORY, SOCIAL ONTOLOGY, AND TEMPORAL ANALYSIS

Prof. Simon Susen has contributed actively to contemporary debates in critical social theory through a series of recent publications and international academic engagements between 2025 and early 2026. His work addresses central questions in social ontology, public space, resonance, and temporality, engaging critically with key figures such as Jürgen Habermas, Walter Benjamin, Clifford Geertz, and Hartmut Rosa.

Dr. Ramesh K. Madaan has recently published two opinion pieces addressing key contemporary debates in India. In *Panjab University Under Siege: Autonomy, Confusion and the Crisis of Faith* (Khabre Junction, November 2025), he examines the challenges facing university autonomy and academic governance. In *Empowering India's Workers and the Unfinished Fight for Justice and Dignity* (Youth Ki Awaaz, November 2025), he reflects on ongoing struggles for labor rights, justice, and dignity. APPLIED RESEARCH AND PUBLIC OPINION STUDIES



In 2025, the ARAR Foundation conducted multiple sociological public opinion Nationwide surveys addressing key socio-political challenges, public trust, civic attitudes, and political perceptions in Republic of Armenia. All studies were implemented using quantitative sociological methods, and the results were publicly presented to ensure transparency and public accessibility.
